

DEACON RUSTY'S REFLECTION

Today we celebrate Laetare Sunday which means rejoice! We are now more than half-way through the season of Lent and so the Church wants to encourage us to persevere in our Lenten sacrifices, penances, and discipline.

The overarching theme this week is light. In fact, St. John's Gospel is structured around seven miracles Our Lord performed to show us that He is the "light [that] shines in the darkness." There isn't enough time to go into each one but in them, Our Lord is gradually revealing his glory to us while at the same time accommodating himself to our weakness; allowing our eyes of faith to slowly get used to the light, before revealing more of the brilliance of his glory!

The healing in the Gospel today is surely among one of the oddest of Our Lord's healings. Why in the world would Jesus spit on the ground and make clay to heal the blind man? There is some symbolism here. The Early Church Fathers saw in this a harkening back to creation where we read that, like a potter, God formed man from the "clay of the ground." Thus, Our Lord restored the man's sight to how it was supposed to be "in the beginning!" Our Lord, then, sent him to wash in the pool of Siloam, which clearly alludes to and anticipates Christian baptism.

His sight restored, in joy and thanksgiving, the man becomes a passionate witness to the truth! He didn't know how it was that clay and washing cured him, he didn't know why Jesus picked him, at first he didn't even know who Jesus was, but he knew one thing: before he was blind and now he could see.

There is an interesting irony that runs through all the Gospels with respect to those needing healing. They are always closer to God than those who think they "have no need of a physician." We see this especially today. Though without sight, it was the blind man who "saw" Jesus clearly both before and after he was healed! Those with sight were the ones who were blind. They did not want the light of Our Lord to reveal that they actually did need a physician, that they too needed to be cleansed of the faults and sins that so often we only become aware of when we are exposed to the light.

There are many lessons we can draw from the readings today, but I'd like to highlight the witness of the blind man. He endured rejection, persecution, and scorn from the religious leaders because he held fast to the truth; namely, that it was Jesus who had healed him! But despite this, he joyfully held fast to the truth! And that is what we are called to as well; to rejoice in and joyfully bear witness to the fullness of the truth, to the deposit of faith that Jesus entrusted to the Church and his faithful disciples. This truth includes the Gospel message of salvation and the universal call to holiness; it includes upholding the dignity of all, with a special obligation to minister to the poor, the sick, and those the world rejects and especially the unborn; this includes joyfully bearing witness to God's plan for marriage and the family. And, especially in and for our culture, we also have an obligation to know why the Magisterium of the Church teaches what she does with regard to life, marriage and contraception, so that we can joyfully bear witness to the sanctity and gift of children and human sexuality as well. In the first reading, Samuel at first judged by appearances and would have anointed as king many whom the Lord had rejected. There is an analogy to truth here. The world often anoints as good and true, what the Lord rejects as evil and sinful. But Samuel, being open to listening to God, accepted and anointed he whom God had chosen. We too must be open to the voice of the Lord and recognize and defend the fullness of the truth He has entrusted to the Church. We must be willing to learn the reason why the Church teaches what she does, for the Church has been anointed by God through the Holy Spirit to proclaim the fullness of the truth as revealed by the light of the Gospel!

I'll close with St. Paul's exhortation to us. In the second reading he said: "You were once darkness, but now you are light in the Lord. Live as children of light, for light produces every kind of goodness and righteousness and truth." This Lent, then, let us rejoice and joyfully learn, live, and proclaim that which is pleasing to the Lord!
